

CARE TEAM: Card Ministry, Meal Ministry & Driving Ministry

Caring for our members only makes us better equipped to reach out to others! As with our families, it is out of love that we care for and care about one another.

- Would you be willing to send a few cards to members on the prayer list or to those who just need a "lift" just a few months out of the year?
- Would you be willing to make or buy a frozen prepared meal for an ailing or recuperating member every so often?
- A Would you be willing to drive someone to worship once in a great while by sharing the driving with nearby ULC neighbors.

Volunteers may participate in one, two, or all three ministries, and when there's a need, the team leader will send out an email request for volunteers.

Card Ministry — *Send a few greeting cards:* In whichever month you volunteer, we'll provide the names, the cards, and stamps (or you may opt to use your own cards/stamps.)

Meal Ministry — *Make a hot dish:*

Make a hot dish on your own time and of your own choosing. It will be labelled, frozen, and stored in the church freezer until needed and usually delivered by one of the pastors. At other times, we will organize a "meal train" for a member currently unable to cook on their own, and this online sign-up program can be opened up not only to the congregation but to the member's own family/friends as well.

Driving Ministry — *Drive a member to worship:*

When home-bound or non-driving members are in need of a ride to worship, we will locate and email a group of ULC members who live nearby and ask if they can take turns sharing the driving responsibility (even if only once in a while). If you are contacted, we hope you will prayerfully consider this request.

Prayers & Squares and Tight Knit

The Prayers and Squares Quilt Ministry makes "prayer" quilts for persons needing prayer and support. The quilts are finished by tying. As a quilt is tied, prayers are said for the recipient. The quilt is given as a tangible sign of prayer, and a statement of our faith in God. We also make "remembrance" quilts to be wrapped around special people or groups during a Sunday service: our military veterans, our graduating high school and college seniors, and others being honored with our prayers for a special reason.

Our group meets every Tuesday from 10 am - 12:30 pm in the Fellowship Hall. All materials and tools are provided. No sewing experience is needed and there are also many jobs that can be done at home on your own time!

- the installation of solar panels on the Southside Community Coalition, the Islamic Center, Redeemer Lutheran Church, and a Habitat for Humanity all electric house in Lansing; and
- joined the Lansing Area chapter of MMIPL (local houses of worship to promote energy conservation).

Facilities, Security, and Stewardship Teams

The **Facilities** team works to maintain and further improve the functioning of the church building. If you enjoy working with your hands, we have opportunities for you. There are onetime projects as well as ongoing tasks. For example, it might require only a day or so to repair some furniture, to paint a wall, to complete minor electrical and plumbing tasks, or to complete the annual window washing task. Other tasks are ongoing and include weekly transport of the paper and plastic generated by ULC to the MSU Recycling Center, as well as ongoing monitoring of the facility heating/cooling system for comfort and energy and efficiency. The Facilities team obtains bids from contractors to undertake larger projects and, after Council/Membership approval, oversees completion of the projects. For more information, contact Dale Romsos.

The **Security Team** assesses the needs and resources required to maintain a safe and secure environment for the ULC building and grounds. It responds to security issues, implements new technology and develops appropriate policies. The team meets on the first Monday of the month at 5:00 pm.

In recent years activities have focused on the installation of surveillance cameras in the building and an access control system for the exterior front doors. The team is currently monitoring the ULC building and parking lot during services. The goal is to be more aware of our surroundings and to check for anything unusual.

Worship Ushers, Communion Assistants and Offering Counters

Worship Ushers have a very special job in any church, as they may be among the first to greet visitors. They are also the first line of 'care', should anyone need extra assistance (e.g., a large-print bulletin, a hearing aid, mobility assistance, communion delivered directly to the pew, etc.)

Ushering tasks include:

- handing out bulletins as people enter the sanctuary,
- collecting giving envelopes and pew cards
- guiding worshipers to communion row by row,
- tidying up the pews after the service.

1-2 ushers are needed at each service and sign-up is done online. There is also an extensive Ushering Guide available for those new to volunteering.

Communion Assistants help the pastor serve Communion each Sunday morning. Six people are needed each Sunday to hold the tray of cups, pour the wine or grape juice. Anyone can volunteer for these tasks by taking a card from the table just inside the Sanctuary.

Offering Counters Each Sunday following worship, 2-3 team members count tally and record the checks and cash collected during the offering. The larger the team, the fewer Sunday any one team member must sign up for. Contact Louise MOntag.

Choirs

There are three **Vocal choirs** at ULC:

- the Senior Choir
- the New Hope Singers (our college/young adult group); and
- the Children's Choir.

All choirs contribute to worship services through vocal music, and participants enhance their vocal skills and basic musicianship through the rehearsal process.

- Instrumentalists are sometimes needed to accompany a choral offering

A bible verse (usually the upcoming Sunday's lectionary) is read aloud; the group then meditates in silence for several minutes; then participants are invited to respond with how any part of the reading speaks to them "at this moment" whether in their own lives or the life of the church; and then sequence is repeated twice again during the hour. Elected and Appointed Positions
