Over 125 volunteers completed service projects on Sept. 10.

On Sunday, Sept. 10 ULC members joined with friends and neighbors to complete over 220 hours of community service. The largest project, Kids Against Hunger food packaging, involved 85 volunteers (35 ULC/50 Islamic Center) that completed 14,000 dehydrated food packages. These packages, when mixed with boiling water, can feed six adults. One-third (5,400) of these packages stayed in our community - going to the MSU Student Food Bank. The remaining food goes to those in need around

the state, nation and world, including food packages that were used for Hurricane Harvey relief.

Other service opportunities that day included packing school kits, making fleece blankets, leading a hymn sing at Brookdale in Haslett, clean-up in the ULC Butterfly Garden and creating Giving Tree tags. Following the service projects, volunteers shared a pizza lunch. Thank you to everyone who made this day a great success! See more photos on page 3.

From the President

Council Recommends Calling Pastor Gary Bunge

For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I among them. (Matthew 18:20)

These are exciting times for University Lutheran Church! Based on the Call Committee's recommendation, your Council voted at their September meeting to proceed with the process of calling Pastor Gary Bunge as our Lead Pastor. Jeff Andresen, Call Committee chair, presented the following at the Council meeting:

"The selection process was time consuming, but straightforward. From the open meetings and congregational surveys and feedback, the committee identified several ministry task and ministry gift priorities. Tasks were: Preaching/Worship, Self Care/Family Life, Pastoral care and visitation, Spiritual Formation/Direction, Administration, and Youth and Family Ministry. Priority gifts for Ministry included: Effective communicator, Helps people develop their spiritual life, Builds a sense of community among the people with whom he/she works, Effective administrator, and Brings joy and good humor to relationships.

During the spring of 2017, after submitting our completed Ministry Site Profile to the ELCA, we started with the names of six potential candidates. Three were submitted by individuals at ULC and three came from the Synod Office. Of those, three indicated serious interest in our position and we conducted multiple interviews with all three. The committee found two of those candidates a good match for ULC and was ready to recommend to Council for their approval (the committee voted for a first and second choice). For a variety of reasons, neither candidate decided to continue the call process with us.

At the beginning of June, we asked the synod for a new list of candidates. The synod came up with two names. The interview process with those candidates began in July and was completed in August. Based on the interviews and interaction with him, Pastor Bunge quickly rose to the top of the committee's list. Following continued contact with references and additional discussion, the committee unanimously voted to forward a recommendation of Pastor Bunge to ULC council for their consideration. While no candidate had all of the desired traits and skills identified earlier in the search process, Pastor Bunge has many. Desirable attributes identified by the committee included: Theological and spiritual grounding, type and quality of preaching, interest in teaching, interest in community support, approachable personality, breadth and length of

professional experience (including administrative), and music background."

Now that your Council has voted to proceed with the call, the next required step is a congregational meeting. If you are a voting member, you should have received a letter announcing a congregational meeting on Sunday, Oct. 8. There, we will vote on two resolutions – the first resolution is to call Pastor Bunge (this will be a written ballot and requires a two-thirds majority for approval) and, if the first passes, the second resolution is for an initial annual compensation package (this can be a simple majority voice vote for approval). You must be a voting member and present in order to cast a vote. Votes by proxy are not allowed.

In order to provide the congregation an opportunity to meet Pastor Gary, the Council has arranged for a "Meet & Greet" on Sunday, Oct. 1 from 3 to 5 p.m. Pastor Gary will lead us in devotions followed by a reception hosted by the Call Committee. All who are part of the ULC community are welcome to attend the Meet & Greet – you do not have to be a member. If you are unable to attend devotions, feel free to stop by anytime between 3:30 and 5 p.m. to meet Pastor Gary and his family.

There is still much to do over the next couple of months. But, first things first. First comes the vote to call Pastor Gary. Assuming that is successful and we approve an acceptable compensation package, we need to transition. Pastor John has been a stable presence during this interim period. We are planning an event on Nov. 5 (his last Sunday with us) to thank him for his ministry with us. Then, we will prepare to receive and support our new Lead Pastor.

We have weathered a lot of changes at ULC over the past 15 months or so. And, God has been with us the entire time. We trust that he will continue to be with us as we enter this new, exciting chapter in our life together as God's people.

To Whom Much Has Been Given . . .

I am so blessed! I think about the daily washing away of my sins, the “just in time” guidance of the Holy Spirit, and the joy of meaningful work with you. As one so blessed, I think about how much is required of me in the remaining days I’m privileged to serve this blessed congregation.

In collaboration with Michael Anderson, the newly appointed Stewardship Team chair, we are planning temple talks for each Sunday this month with stories of the bountiful ways ULC is blessed. Reminded of our rich giftedness, you will then be invited on All Saints Sunday, Nov. 5, to express your financial commitments for the coming year, made out of a deep, heartfelt gratitude to God, taking seriously these words of Jesus:

From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required.
Luke 12: 48b

I pray that you will hear these words not as a heavy burden but as words

of guidance from the One who every single day renews our minds, restores our souls, and re-energizes our bodies so that we can generously give of ourselves and “our” possessions to enrich the lives of others.

For Phylis and me, even before we met each other, tithing was a given; giving 10 percent of our income to the ministries of the church was an automatic for us. Even when our collective income was very thin, tithing remained a guiding requirement. And in our experience, we were never wanting in what mattered most: love given and received, adequate shelter, food, access to health care, and above all the gift of a growing trust that God would provide what God knew we and our children needed. Often, we have been able to give offerings well beyond the tithe to a variety of charitable causes. To us this giving feels like a gracious requirement. It earns us no special favors, no guarantees of a problem-free life, no

expectation of material prosperity. But it is richly fulfilling. Jesus’ words that *much will be required* feels not like a demand but a gracious invitation to a meaningful life.

Of course, money is only part of our “entrustment.” Every skill, aptitude, and passion to do our best is a gift from God. In every waking hour we are given opportunity (and are expected) to do something thoughtful and kind and good for others. But in the annual rhythm of congregational life, fall is usually the time we do talk about money, about making conscious decisions about how much we are “required” to give for the ministry of the congregation, the family of faith of which we are part. Through a variety of brief witnessses, we’ll be reminded each Sunday this month how blessed we are, how so many lives are graced by the ministries of ULC, how privileged we are to be stewards of God’s grace.

Utility Cost Savings Seen This Summer

There is more good news from our ULC Facilities Team concerning energy use reductions in our building. The latest utility costs indicate a 44 percent reduction in electricity use for July-August compared to the same time last year. This savings may be attributed to a combination of the installation of LED light bulbs throughout the church, a cooler summer and a policy of only cooling spaces in occupied areas of the building.



Through these efforts ULC is saving energy, reducing our carbon footprint and continuing to be good stewards of our creation.

A small group of ULC members will be travelling to Novi on Oct. 2 to observe and gather more information about a possible solar array collaboration with the Islamic Center.

Video Surveillance

You have probably noticed the video surveillance stickers on the ULC front doors. The ULC Security Team felt it was important that anyone who enters our building should know that they are seen by a camera. One camera focuses on the front doors and another scans the narthex. A third camera is located on the lower level and mainly views the bottom of the staircase area.



day, we felt uncomfortable having the administrative assistant dealing with them by herself. We requested that she lock the office doors when alone, but felt a need to do more.

The Security Team then began extensive research of how to make the administrative assistant and church more secure. We learned a lot from the following:

- Informal risk assessments by several law enforcement officials

We realized that surveillance cameras were a basic tool in improving church security and were able to install a digital camera system with eight camera capacity using funds from the Marilyn Pierce bequest. A monitor for the cameras sits on Britny's desk and she can show you footage from the cameras... or ask me to show you the same thing on my cell phone! Incidentally, we have been told that the video surveillance stickers on the front doors can be a deterrent to criminals all by themselves.

Why are there surveillance cameras in our church? Council formed the Security Team last year and one of the first concerns for the team was that the administrative assistant was working alone at times in the office. With homeless people sometimes wandering into church during the

The ULC Council met on Sept. 15. The following are a summary of key action items from the meeting:

- Appointed Jennifer Tracy to fill the vacancy created on Council with the resignation of Linda Triemer. Jennifer's term of office will expire on Dec. 31, 2018.
- Council approved the unanimous recommendation of the Call Committee to extend a call to Pastor Gary Bunge as Lead Pastor.
- Approved a compensation package that meets the minimum requirements of the Synod Guidelines for rostered clergy.
- Established Oct. 1, from 3 to 5 p.m. as a time for congregation to meet Pastor Bunge.
- Set a special congregational meeting for Oct. 8 immediately after the 10:45 a.m. service to approve extending a call to Pastor Bunge and to approve a compensation package.



Council Notes

- Approved paying the initial 25 percent in advance for improvements to the organ to lock in the price because of recent increases in wood costs as a result of the hurricanes in the south.
- Extended the part-time contract with Pastor Schleicher through Nov. 5.
- Approved holding a pot luck luncheon on Nov. 5, following the 10:45 service, to recognize Pastor Schleicher's service to ULC.
- Set the Annual Congregational Meeting for Nov. 12, immediately following the 10:45 a.m. service.
- Approved holding only one service (at 10:45 a.m.) on Oct 8, Nov 5 and Nov 12. Note that Education Hour will be held at 9:40 each day.
- Received the first draft of the 2018 ULC Budget. Additional discussions will be conducted with Council between now and the Annual Congregational Meeting on Nov. 12.
- Appointed Jerry Lindman to the Endowment Committee to fill the remainder of the term of Annette Ophaug.
- Appointed Dale Romsos as a Resource Coordinator on the Lead Management Team.
- Approved the membership of Marian MacBeth through affirmation of baptism, Jack Walch as an associate member, and the transfer of Walt Appel and Emly Horne to the Church Triumphant
- Approved hiring Elizabeth Althouse as Sunday School coordinator through Dec. 2017.

Names, Names, Names!

This piece by Pastor Gus Kopka seems timely as we begin a new school year with many new faces.



“One of the most challenging aspects of my prospective ministry in your midst will, no doubt, be the matter of learning a large number of new names – and keeping them associated with the appropriate faces.

Already I have caught myself in

embarrassing situations of associating the wrong name with the right person, or was it the right name with the wrong person?

From repeated personal experience I know that the best way in which to remember the name of a person is to have experienced an intimate encounter with that person. Once I have looked at his world through his eyes, crawled under his skin, laid my mind to rest a while with his mind, shared his concern, carried his burden THEN I know who he is, what his name is and what is in his name! To be sure, this does not take away all the mystery of that person. But it does move associations beyond labels, such as names can often become. It does, in fact, involve me in the mystery that is “the other.”

And the names you have are many. They are beautifully diverse. Those names I have come to “know” somewhat with

their intriguing idiosyncrasies and mysterious meanings run the human alphabet from A to Z, Anderson (Joe and Bob and Beverly and Morris and...) to Zindler. Because of this initial entry into each other's being the mystery of God's being has taken on more meaning for me. For God is in, with and among all men. He is from A to Z or, as the Book of Revelation suggests, from A to O, the Alpha and Omega (for those of you who like your alphabet the Greek way).

What's in a name? Mystery! And the enticing intrigue to enter in and share! Thanks for having shared of your-selves during my repeated visits of the past two months. Thanks for sharing your food and drink and your food for thought. Thanks for you! Give thanks to God for your name and all that is in it as I shall continue to give thanks to Him for your mysterious you. That will keep us while we are absent from each other and until we see God face to face!”

Pastor Gus Kopka joined us in March of 1973, so he probably wrote this around that time. It is a timely reminder as we welcome guests, new members and new staff that we introduce ourselves to those we do not know and wear our name tags. I'm certain those new to ULC will appreciate the help.

Our Synod has sent a delegation to Honduras almost every year for about 15 years where we used our hands to truly do God's work. We have always been welcomed with hugs and sent home with wonderful memories and prayers.

Now it was our turn to welcome our partners and show them about faith and life in Michigan. We celebrated the work of God through the use of our hands.

The Hondurans visited many churches and shared their projects with all in attendance. In Saginaw they attended a Spanish worship service, met with a pastor in Midland who went to Honduras years ago and worked with Reverend Rolando before either of them entered the ministry and shared profound faith stories.

In Lansing we took part in the Synod Wednesday Eucharist service where Bishop Satterlee presented our partners with gifts of thanks. We joined Pastor Jan Hite at a worship service involving the children in the Helping Hands school; this was a special event as some of our guests had children at home who they were missing, and they had many hugs waiting for a little child. Our guests could also relate to this program as they have programs in Honduras that reach out to children – offering education, food and health care. We also visited St. Paul's food pantry and community garden.

Both Faith in Okemos and ULC hosted a potluck followed by a presentation from our guests. Reverend Rolando and Luis Alfredo were honored to meet with the Musers for breakfast to learn another side of life in mid-Michigan. And, of course, there was a short tour through campus and a visit to the MSU Dairy Store.

From Lansing they traveled to Grand Rapids and once again spent time with several congregations from Lake Michigan and Muskegon to downtown Grand Rapids and a social action ministry. They joined in a Honduras Celebration Sunday at Trinity Lutheran and a community picnic in Sparta. They also spent some time at Meijer

Garden and renewed friendships with supporters of the Health for Life program.

We found our Honduran partners to be dedicated to their church and to have the needs of the church and congregations foremost in their heart. They were wonderful guests and very appreciative of all that was offered. Another commented when asked if this was a worthwhile experience for them, "Super valuable, a unique experience in my life, unforgettable. I met wonderful people. I am taking much learning for my life and for my church."

All of this happened because of the "hands" of many people. I would like to thank our ULC council for hosting an evening with our Honduran partners. Special thanks go to Brandon Baswell for organizing the event and cooking the chicken. We also had several translators from ULC who helped at various times – Karen Sanders, Annette Stanley, Lupe Saucedo, Dale Harpstead, and Pastor Haley Vay.
