Connecting as Neighbors

Planning continues for a follow-up event to the post-election interfaith conversation held at ULC last December. Feelings were strong that evening to continue interaction, dialogue and action. Members of ULC and the Islamic Center are now working with more neighbors, specifically the Methodists and the Neighborhood Association.

The planning group has targeted the evening of Apr. 21, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. (location not set—but definitely "in the neighborhood") to



consider together what it means to be a "neighbor." Faith leaders will offer some historical and theological understandings of the concept of "neighbor." (For those of us in the Christian tradition, the compelling story of the Good Samaritan is, of course, huge.) Discussion will continue on neighborly behaviors,

mindful of the opposite tendencies in every heart, toward discerning neighborly actions the Lord calls us to embrace in turbulent times. Consideration is being given about announcing that night a joint service activity, tentatively with Habitat for Humanity.

Habitat for Humanity

Habitat for Humanity is a worldwide nonprofit organization founded on the premise that everyone deserves a decent place to live. The local Capitol Region chapter is currently celebrating its 30th year. They have programs for affordable home ownership, home repair, and wheelchair ramp construction.

ULC members have a rich history of partnering with Habitat by supplying volunteers and funds for rehabbing

homes and building brand new ones. Barb Kissling and Jane Braatz have coordinated ULC's participation with Habitat in the past. The local Habitat chapter has a lot planned for this coming year. They have 89 projects planned - 50 home repairs, 30 wheelchair ramps, four new homes, and two rehab homes.

The homes built are not free to the new owners as they make affordable monthly mortgage payments. They

also have to put in many hours of sweat equity on their own home or on other Habitat homes.

Please consider supporting Habitat for Humanity. There are envelopes in the pews, or simply make out a check to ULC with Habitat for Humanity on the memo line. All donated funds will go to the local Capitol Region chapter of Habitat for Humanity



Germany, Tanzania and Equids

Improvements in the lives of Tanzanians require that their children have better access to quality education. One of the challenges for girls in Tanzania is that they face significant gender-unique barriers in attaining an

education. Come and learn how a ULC Endowment Grant to the Bungo Lutheran Church in Morogoro, Tanzania will assist at-risk girls advance their education.

Apr. 16 Easter Sunday - No Forum

Apr. 23 - Hal Schott, MSU Professor of Large Animal Clinical Sciences. Did you know that more than 90 percent of the equids in the world are used to improve the lives of families in third world countries? Veterinary care is largely non-existent for these literal "work horses." Come hear about a new MSU project in which ULC member Hal Schott took eight veterinary students to provide care for more than 800 working burros, mules, and horses early this year.

Rick Steves' Luther and the Reformation

The March 2017 *Living Lutheran* has an article about Rick Steves and the documentary he created for his PBS series devoted to Martin Luther and the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. The article states, "The hour-long documentary covers dense subject matter, a variety of locations and wide swaths of history... Throughout the special, Steves returns to the theme that the

Reformation wasn't only a seismic religious event, but an important chapter in the arc of societal progress."

The article ends with a quote from Steves, "Given that I was producing a TV show primarily for secular media...I couldn't simple end with a theological high-five and say, 'Hooray! We're saved by faith alone. See you in heaven!' That would be a

fine conclusion for a church audience. But I was determined that this project would have a much broader audience."

History of Our Interesting Sanctuary

In the Spring of 1973 architect Dan Toshach was asked to provide a statement on the architectural character of ULC to further our appreciation of the symbolism which went in its planning. His statement follows:

“The plan of the church is established on a crossing of two axes of lines of communication which dominate the services held in the church. One axis is the axis of visual communication, which is centered on the main aisle focusing attention on the altar, cross, and those portions of the sacrament carried on from that station of the chancel.

The other axis is one of audio communication which connects the pulpit in the northeast corner of the space, the prime source of the spoken Word, with the choir and organ loft at the southwest corner of the space, the prime source of the musical portions of the service.

The imposition of these two axes on what otherwise would have been a more traditional rectilinear nave and chancel space, plus the desire to generate a more naturally flowing space in the course of entry into the Church, resulted in the angularity of the plan. The two axes also led to the generation of the hyperbolic paraboloidal roof. The point of equal height on the timbers flows in line with the visual axis and the high

corners of the form center over the two ends of the audio axis.

The choice of materials, wood and concrete, was made in order to express the natural materials of God’s world, and their form and finish express the great strength of the Christian faith as expressed in the Lutheran service. The colors used in the carpet and windows relate to the Christian faith and provide warmth to the church atmosphere.

The chancel area is designed to be plain, simple and uncluttered in order that the main focus can be directed towards the service and the few simple paraments and furnishings required in the Lutheran service. We recommend that any additions to the furniture and paraments at the chancel area be made only after careful review as to their usefulness and meaning to the overall service, with particular attention given to the compatibility of their design with that of the church.

I am personally very pleased with the results of the project and I am sure that it will indeed prove to be a successful house of worship for University Lutheran Church.”

We started worshipping in the Harrison Road church on Jan. 30, 1972 just a few months before this was written.

Buttons, small flowers, bows, etc for trim (glue gun if necessary).

Lutheran/Episcopal Joint Refugee Statement

ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth A. Eaton and leaders from The Episcopal Church, the Anglican Church of Canada, and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada issued an Ash Wednesday statement addressing refugees and migrants.

“This Lent we call our Churches to be continually mindful of the global refugee and migration crises, and the injustices and conflicts that have swelled the statistics to a number greater than ever in the history of the world. We acknowledge the good work done by so many of our synods and dioceses and parishes in sponsoring refugees, welcoming them, accompanying them and advocating for them as they settle in our countries. Similarly, we commend the compassionate

work of our partner churches in other lands and intergovernmental bodies caring for migrants and refugees. We call on our Churches not to weary of this good work in the name of God.

May this Season of Lent be especially marked by our prayers and advocacy for refugees and migrants – on the run, in United Nations camps, in waiting, in our communities... And let it be marked by a continuing resolve in welcoming the stranger in our midst, for such hospitality is in keeping with the faith we proclaim. (Matthew 25:31-40)”

The following items were discussed at the Mar. 21 meeting of the ULC Council:



- Received a report from Pastor Schleicher on the feasibility of conducting a capital campaign. The good news is that Pastor John had received tentative gifts totaling a little over \$112,000 towards upgrading the organ and \$14,000 towards mortgage debt reduction. Following discussion, Council determined that additional information is required before a recommendation can be made to the Congregation. Council will be discussing the campaign at the April meeting.
- Approved the guest preachers for the Good Friday service.
- Approved an increase in the salary for the administrative secretary as was included in the 2017 ULC budget.
- Received an update from Pastor Schleicher on the possibility of ULC, the Islamic Center and University Methodist Church (jointly) being involved in establishing a solar garden on ULC property. Council was supportive of obtaining additional information on the project. More information is expected at the April Council meeting.
- Pastor Sarah Midzalkowski reported that the Synod has confirmed that additional campus ministry funds will be available, but they do not know when or the amount. More information is expected at the next meeting.
- After discussion, approved \$10,000 to be allocated to the anticipated lead pastor moving expenses, a tithe from the Marilyn Pierce Bequest to consist of \$4,000 to the N/WLM Synod, \$2,000 to the ELCA World Hunger Campaign and \$3,000 to be allocated to the Social Action Team for the annual local benevolence distributions.
- Approved the appointment of Howard Pierce and Chris Tague to the ULC Audit Committee.
- Decided to postpone the May special Congregational Meeting to take action on the proposed amendments to the ULC Constitution until another time in the future.
- Appointed Michael and Vicki Anderson as the ULC representatives to the Synod Assembly.
- Discussed ULC's Vision Statement. After discussion, it was decided that additional discussion around the ULC Vision Statement should occur, but that those discussions will occur once a new lead pastor is in place.
- Received a report from the Call Committee that the names and supporting documents have been received for two lead pastor candidates. The Call Committee is in the process of interviewing the two candidates. More information will be shared as progress is made.
- Agreed to join with synod Honduras Mission Team to serve as hosts to four representatives from the Lutheran Church in Honduras that will be visiting the Lansing area Aug. 15-17. While plans are still being developed, at this time we are tentatively planning a church-wide potluck on the evening of Aug. 16. as part of the evening festivities welcoming the representatives.
- Directed the Stewardship Team to develop a method to collect information from members on their time and abilities that could be utilized by ULC.

Barbara Riegle, "Distinguished Kiwanian of the Year"

She was honored for bringing in new members and for participating in a number of projects. Barbara is working with the Haslett Superintendent of Schools to foster a closer relationship. The Haslett Kiwanis Club has donated 3-D printers to two schools. Barbara works with two youth groups. The Builders Club for middle school children and the high school Key Club to encourage volunteerism, build character, improve grades, and develop leadership skills through various projects.

Graduating from MSU with a degree in Medical Technology led Barbara

into scientific research. Her microbiology professor was so impressed with her work that he hired her right out of college for his lab, where she worked for six years. A doctoral student from Japan taught her how to grow cells. She became a cell culture guru, which was an enormously valuable technique for her to master.

After taking a few years off to rear their son and daughter, she worked for the USDA in the Avian Disease and Oncology Laboratory. Her knowledge of cell culture was invaluable, as they studied tumor viruses and other diseases of poultry. The laboratory was well known worldwide for their Marek's Disease vaccine to help prevent the death of millions of chickens. She was privileged to travel to Moscow where she helped teach cell culture at a collaborative research lab. Barbara retired in 2010 after 35 years.

Barbara's hard working mother of six was the greatest influence in her young life, teaching her to move forward, help herself, do her best, and always work hard. She met graduate student Gail Riegle in a physiology class while an undergrad at MSU. He, a Methodist, and she, a nominal Roman Catholic, visited churches and liked Pastor Herb and the welcoming University Lutheran congregation on

Ann Street. She was baptized there, and Pastor Herb married them there in 1960. At ULC she is a member of the Social Action team. She and Jan Mace co-chair the Welcome Team with help from their spouses who "welcome" all members and visitors with delicious snacks and beverages. Long ago she taught Sunday School, co-chaired VBS, was a Circle member, and served on numerous committees.

Jeff Andresen Honored by Extension Agents



Jeff Andresen received the Outstanding Extension Specialist award for 2016 from the Michigan Association of Extension Agents. The MAEA is the primary professional organization of extension personnel throughout the state. ULC Sanctuary Sound System Upgrades

The Electronic Resources Team recently made two upgrades to the sound system using designated funds. First, the sound system requires good audio in for broadcasting good audio out. We upgraded three wireless microphone receivers, so all individual wireless microphones (5) are the same quality and manufacturer. The two units we replaced were quite dated.



In addition, we dedicated a third new receiver to a hand-held wireless microphone. This upgrade allows us to dedicate a wireless microphone to each of our three pastors so we can adjust them specifically for the person's voice. The other two individual wireless microphones will be rotated between deacons and guest speakers.

The sixth receiver allows us to always have a dedicated hand-held wireless microphone available. This can be used for children sermons, when someone is up front and needs some quick audio enhancement, and when audio is needed for the bell choir. Before the upgrade, the handheld wireless microphones shared a receiver which caused problems when switching back and forth.

The second upgrade is quite exciting. We added an option to broadcast sound from the microphones by FM radio to personal receivers. These receivers have a standard output jack for plugging in ear buds, a head set, or a personal T-loop hearing aid assist. We purchased six personal T-loop assist units. We are testing these with individuals in the congregation who have T-loop enabled hearing aids. We need to learn how to adjust the sound system output for best T-Loop performance. Please be patient with us as we learn, but soon we hope to have the units available at the back of the sanctuary when you enter. Please let Jim Lorenz, Luke Reese or Will Mahoney know if you could use some hearing device assistance.

We made one additional upgrade which was to replace the CD burner with a digital recorder. Music CD media was getting hard to obtain. The digital format allows us to transfer files easier plus we can create CDs from standard CD media.

Stay "tuned" for improved audio options. Check the bulletin for updates on the use of the T-loop assist units.
