I find it hard to believe that this is my final newsletter article after writing newsletter articles nearly every month for 39 years! I also find


it hard to believe that I've served as a pastor for 39 years and will be retiring at the end of September. In some ways it seems like I just started a few years ago.

MDIV Student Addy Stuever on Environmental Justice and Rural Ministry

Editor's note: Addy Stuever participated in the ULC Campus Ministry program last year and is now a Master of Divinity(MDIV) student at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (LSTC). She

was featured in the August 2023 E.PISTLE newsletter:

For incoming MDiv student Addy Stuever, the call to ministry was deeply entwined with her passion for justice. In fact, her passion for justice is so strong that during college, Stuever initially anticipated that she might pursue a career in politics. "I expected that I would go into public policy or international development," Stuever says. She not only studied these fields through her Environmental Studies and Sustainability major, but also threw herself into practical applications of what she was learning. "I got myself an internship with the Senate Agricultural Committee. I went to two United Nations Events a representative of 4-H." These experiences confirmed for Stuever, that her interests in environmental justice and the success

of rural communities were something that she wanted to pursue throughout her life.

However, when it came time to consider next steps, Stuever had a stark realization: "I wasn't done learning," she says. Furthermore, she realized that the things that really spoke to her about her major were the opportunities for engaging in systems thinking and

working directly with communities to come up with solutions for persistent problems. With a family deeply rooted in ELCA Lutheranism, it wasn't a surprise to many that "somewhere around Thanksgiving of 2021 is when I went, 'Oh, hey, family, I think I might go to seminary!" Stuever remembers. For Stuever, attending a seminary that shared her justice-oriented values and that was within driving distance of home in Michigan proved to be crucial: LSTC proved to be the perfect fit.

Stuever's family was universally supportive of her decision. In fact, it was a call with her great aunt Joan that led her to apply to the ELCA Fund for Leaders scholarship to support her journey at LSTC. In telling her aunt about her plans for graduate school, she said, "There's probably a lot of scholarships available. I just donated to the Fund for Leaders. You should

definitely check it out." A couple of months later, Stuever applied, and was awarded a full-tuition scholarship that supports students attending ELCA seminaries with the intent of becoming a rostered minister of either word and sacrament or word and service. "It means for me that I can attend seminary coming right out of my undergrad," Stuever says. "It's really helpful for me."

For Stuever, the path ahead is now clear and exciting: "I want to be a rural pastor," she says. "[In areas like the one in which I grew up] the Church really was the center of the community...my vision for rural ministry is to build community centers, build places where young people and their parents and anyone, even if they don't attend church regularly, comes for community events... and to experience life as a community." Perhaps that looks like serving the Church she currently attends with her family in Michigan, or another like it. Stuever is open to anything and remains excited about the prospect of serving communities around the country. But, as she says with a smile, "it would be lovely if I could be right back home."

Ian Brown: I graduated from Okemos High School. I will be attending Michigan State in the fall, majoring in Fisheries and Wildlife.



Thank you to all who contributed funds for the ground mount solar system. It will be completed soon. We will then enjoy even lower electric costs, be less dependent on fossil fuels, and have a visual symbol of our commitment to caring for God's creation.

Grounds Crew

Last year at this time a crew was working in an overgrown Memorial Garden preparing it for a new design and planting. The work was completed, and for almost a year now we have been able

to enjoy the fruits of that labor. The new bushes and trees have blossomed, offering a quiet place where you can walk or sit and experience the beautiful setting.

However, the garden crew has still been hard at work preparing the area north of the parking lot for the new solar panels. This has required removing a lot of brush, digging up roots, and trimming limbs from trees to make the area large enough to accommodate the 50 solar panels to be

installed later this summer. Once operational, this 20.25 kw array will reduce the current ULC electric bill by half. Norm Jolin, Dale

Romsos, Larry Wagenknecht, Rick Milligan, and Jim Lorenz have worked diligently to get the area ready for the installation.

To celebrate, ULC will be hosting the annual Food Packing Event with the Islamic Center on Sunday, Oct. 8 at 11:30 a.m., a bye week for MSU college football. ULC is looking for at least 45 volunteers to help package food and clean up after the event. Sign-ups for the event will be made available in the near future. The event typically only takes a couple

September Outreach of the Month Kids Hope USA - Making a Difference!

The September Outreach focus is Kids Hope. Please support us with an extra offering using a pew envelope, direct deposit at MSFCU, or use our donate button on the website, www.ulcel.org. Indicate "Kids Hope" in the memo. Read below how we are really making a difference.

One afternoon five years ago Pastor Gary called and asked me if I would be the Director for Kids Hope USA at ULC. I had never heard of it before and had

no clue what it was. He told me he had been a Kids Hope mentor at his previous church for eight years and thought it was a terrific ministry which would benefit students in a local elementary school. I soon learned that Kids Hope USA is a national ministry that began in western Michigan over 25 years ago and has spread to more than 35 states with over 800 programs. It assists church members in mentoring students with a goal of establishing a relationship with at-risk students, so they feel special and loved. Volunteers mentor at the school for one hour each week.

After accepting the role of director, the first order of business was to find a local school for this new ULC ministry to partner with. Ms. Brown, the principal of Forest View Elementary, a pre-k through third grade building in the Lansing School district located three miles south of ULC, let us know she believed we could make a positive difference in the lives of her students.

The next step was to find mentors and pair them with a child to begin the process of supporting a student who needed the extra help and attention. Great care is taken in making a match that will be a blessing to both the student and the mentor beginning with a referral form filled out by the student's teacher and reviewed by Principal Brown and myself. Some students need academic help while others are struggling to make friends and feel like they fit in or are dealing with the disruption of big changes in their home life. What all our mentees share is the need for unconditional love and one on one attention.

So, how were the ULC mentors going to help these children who could be in Kindergarten through third grade? The most important thing a mentor does is to

show up. There is great power and love in letting a child know they are there just for them. That one hour in the child's life can become the highlight of their week. Having an adult care enough to be present with them whether they are having a good or a bad day and to interact with them without judgement is the true blessing of this ministry. The hour is also most often filled with fun. Our Kids Hope supply room is filled with materials to use including games, puzzles, puppets, art supplies, books and educational materials.

Many of our mentors can share stories of a breakthrough in reading, in math, or in connecting with a student who struggles with communicating.

Each mentor also receives extensive training both in person at ULC and online through the national headquarters. Kids Hope has experts that share how to teach a child life-skills such as resiliency and ways in which they are smart to build self-confidence; as well as tools for coping with trauma, child safety, overcoming barriers to reading, closure and much more. Recognizing that there will be days when a mentor is in need of support, Kids Hope is structured so that each mentor is paired with a prayer partner with whom they can share the blessings and challenges of their mentoring journey and who assures that they enter Forest View fortified with prayer.

Also, the blessing does not end with the students. Our mentoring team works together to show the teachers support and love as well by providing small gifts, treats and an end of the year meal that lets these public-school heroes know they are recognized and appreciated for the challenging work they do day in and day out.

The ULC Kids Hope ministry is sustainable only as long as we have members willing to mentor partnered with a caring individual who will support and pray for the match. Juneteenth At The Capitol

(Emancipation Day, Freedom Day, Liberty Day, Jubilee Day, Celebration Day)

Pastor Haley Vay transported a group of us on the ULC bus to the noon festivities at the base of the Capitol steps. We joined other Lansing area faith communities on June 19th to celebrate the freedom that marks the end of slavery in the United States.

Leading up to this: President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863- not every state followed his

order to free slaves.250,000 Texas slaves didn't learn of their freedom for two more years.

President John F. Kennedy submitted legislation to congress that became the Civil Rights Act of 1964. President Joe Biden made Juneteenth a Federal Holiday in 2021.

The Rev. Stanley Jenkins of Lansing's First Presbyterian Church and the Justice League of Greater Lansing asked us to look at the African Americans standing across from us as we read the Apology to them asking for forgiveness for the sin of slavery and its aftermath. There was a spirit of unity, humility and appreciation that was spoken and felt. Speaking words of accountability is where reconciliation and healing can start, because words spoken honestly and from the heart are liberating for both

those saying and receiving the words. It's from that point where there can be loving acts to "repair the breach"- Isaiah 58:12 "you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of the streets to live in".

Prince Solace, the President of the Justice League of Greater Lansing, a 501C3 organization, told us about their effort to make the connection between faith and racial justice in the form of reparations in

the greater Lansing area, mainly from white congregations in the form of educational scholarships, home ownerships, and business startups. This effort leads to healing and becoming the "beloved community" that Martin Luther King Jr. described.

We know from many references in both the old and new testaments how passionate God is for justice in His creation. The prophets spoke of justice. Jesus showed us the way of justice. ULC Time Capsules

ULC has had three different time capsules or cornerstones. The first one was placed in the cornerstone




November 23, 1947 Ann Street Church cornerstone.

when they started building the Ann Street Church on Nov. 23, 1947. The theme was "Let Us Arise and Build."

The second time capsule was put in the cornerstone of the education addition to the Ann Street Church

on May 3, 1959. We have lists of all the contents of these two cornerstones.

The third time capsule was put into the altar at the new University Lutheran Church on Harrison Road on Founder's Day on April 27, 1975.

celebration. We knew some of the contents from the list of items placed in the original time capsule of the Ann Street Church in 1945, and we knew that these items were transferred to the time capsule in 1975.



October 2019
Ann Street Education Unit cornerstone removed.

We expected to find items from the 1959-time capsule which was in the

cornerstone of the Education Annex on Ann Street. However, there was nothing from 1959 in the box. This led us to realize that the Education Annex time capsule was never removed from the cornerstone. We contacted University Seventh-day Adventist Church, the current owner of the Ann Street church. Working with a member of the church who had a masonry business, we arranged to have the cornerstone removed in October 2019. The cornerstone was reached quickly; however, the force of the saw and the water involved damaged a lot of the contents. Previous moisture in the box also caused

mildew and damage to most items. Many of the contents have been copied so they can be preserved, and some had to be discarded.

Now, after retrieving the 1959 box and surviving COVID, we are finally returning to the altar items from

the 1945-, 1959-, and 1975-time capsules plus objects featuring ULC and the world today. Together, these items tell some of the story of our church. We hope the contents of the time capsule will interest ULC members worshipping in 2041 – our 100th anniversary!
