Feeding Our Neighbors

Our food distribution, also known as Food Movers, has grown over the last 10 years. As the need in our community has increased, our numbers have as well. We now serve about 270 families each month. This ministry is an important way we can interact with and have a positive effect on our community.

Each month we need 30-40 volunteers to make the distribution go smoothly. Tasks include registering the shoppers on tablets or instructing them about self-registration using their cell phones. Volunteers are also needed for traffic control to keep the lines flowing smoothly and to place food into vehicles as the shoppers drive by the food stations. Drivers are also needed to transport food to Spartan Village for shoppers without vehicles.



Healing During Lent

As I write this, I'm writing in the midst of the many gray, drab and dreary days that we've had this winter. It's hopeful to be writing about Lent which begins later this month, because the word Lent comes from an Old English word *lencten* meaning spring or when the days lengthen. Spring and lengthening days always feel hopeful in the midst of the gray, drab and dreary days of winter. I'm already ready for spring.

This year, the season of Lent will mark the return of in-person Lenten services at noon which will include worship and study, followed by a soup and bread meal. We'll record that service and then stream it at 7 p.m. on Facebook.

The focus of our worship and time together this Lent will be healing. We've come through some very difficult years with the pandemic and much has transpired that has not been easy, and in fact has caused significant hurt. We've been isolated from others. The way we've done things has changed and that has been a source of grief. We've lost people we know and love to COVID and for



other reasons. We've experienced deep divide within our country, a divide that has even divided families and friends. We've experienced broken relationships. Life is different now. And as a result, we are a people in need of healing.

When we read through any of the Gospels, it doesn't take long to notice that healing was central to Jesus' ministry, so as we focus on healing, we'll focus on five different biblical passages that involve some kind of healing: physical healing; environmental healing, emotional healing; relational healing; and societal healing. And as we focus on these types of healing, we'll see what

Jesus and God's word has to say about each.

I'm reminded of Jesus' words as he stood up in the synagogue to read on the sabbath when he read from the prophet Isaiah:

¹⁸"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free,

¹⁹to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

This is what Jesus' ministry was all about! Healing. Healing in whatever way it is that we need to be healed.

Join us this Lent on Wednesdays as we probe the biblical understanding of healing, explore Jesus' gift of healing, and worship and pray together for healing.

Youth Group



ULC Library Catalog on ULC Website

Have you ever wondered if the ULC library has something that might help you with a Bible study? Or planning a devotion? Or helping you understand a concept that may be new to you? Did you know that you can search the ULC Library catalog in the comfort of your home?

The Library Team has spent time recently updating the Library page on the ULC website. To access the library catalog, go to the ULC website (ulcel.org) and select “Resources.” In the pull-down menu you will see “Memorial Library.” Once you open the library site you will see a picture of and general information about the library. Just under that information is a link to the library catalog. It says:



As shown, the catalog can be searched three ways – by the author, title and subject of the item. Find the entry that interests you and then write down the **title** and **call number** of any materials that might be useful. When you come to the library you can find the call number indicated and hopefully, have the needed information. If you are not able to find the book, please

leave a note with your name and the materials you are looking for. A member of the library team can locate the information and let you know when it is available.

Searching by subject can be helpful if you do not have a particular item in mind. Make note of the call numbers and search those areas when you are in the library. You should find all the materials available on that subject and can look at them at your leisure.

Other information on the library website includes a list of new materials and several links to various Christian websites.

Please visit the library website and ULC’s Library. There is always something new to see.






The Storied Life of A.J. Fikry

The most impactful thing that happened this year for me was when we read a book together about stuttering. My student stutters and is often quite quiet and reluctant to talk and share. We read a children's book written by two stutterers of color, describing the challenges and feelings that surround this disorder. I could visibly see a change in my mentee while we were reading the book and his face literally lit up! I have noted him to be more likely to talk and interact since then. It was a wonderful moment!

Almost every time I go, we play either Connect 4 or Candyland. In December we also made a fun Christmas tree craft out of construction paper, markers and foam stickers which he really enjoyed. ~ Lori Johnson

My story is simple. I bought a child-size soccer ball last year when I first met my student. We spend about 10 minutes every session kicking it back and forth. It is soft and small enough that I don't have to worry about breaking anything. While he is distracted by playing, we talk about his family, friends, favorite things, plans for the summer, etc. I have found it to be a great interviewing tool.

Worship Reflections

Many of us grew up in a church where the order of service and the music were predictably the same - familiar hymns, well-known composers of preludes and postludes - an order we could count on. If we traveled on vacation, finding a Lutheran church meant finding the familiar in a different geographic location.

So what's going on when we encounter worship like we experienced on Jan. 15?

The pre-service gathering music featured "Glory" where former music scholarship student Myles Jones sings with poet Joe Davis providing a poetic counter point. This is far from being traditionally Lutheran!

Then, Kristie's prelude followed. It was J. S. Bach's "The Old Year Now Hath Passed Away." Bach, we know about. Throughout the worship we sang familiar hymns and either sang or listened to less familiar music from the African American Tradition. Artwork, too, was not traditional.

Children listened to MLK Jr's vision of a just society and Pastor Haley Vay preached on the text highlighting the



Spirit's presence with Jesus in the wilderness of the real world.

The changes you observe with varying music styles and lessons come from our congregation's intention to be an inclusive worshipping community of faith in a global world. While we have only occasional worshippers from other traditions, they are more apt to feel comfortable if they encounter music and stories familiar to them. We benefit by broadening our understanding of other worship styles and practices. In this way we grow together as people of faith.

"Precious Lord, Take My Hand," sung by the choir on Jan. 15, was Martin Luther King, Jr's favorite hymn - a blues inspired song often sung by Mahalia Jackson. He had requested it to be sung the night he was assassinated.

In these innovations in our worship, the familiar is not eliminated, it becomes part of a more inclusive whole. It enriches our understanding of who we are as people of faith living in an increasingly diverse world.

Farewell to Food Waste This Lent

During this time of prayer, penance, sacrifice and good works, we might consider how God is inviting us to rethink our food perceptions and habits. Consider these facts:

- Overall, about one third of the world's food produced for human consumption is thrown away
- Food waste is the no. 1 material in U.S. landfills, accounting for 24.1% of municipal solid waste, equating to 119 billion pounds, 130 billion meals and costing \$408 billion annually (average American family of four throwing out \$1,500 worth)
- In the U.S., organic waste is the largest source of methane emissions, which is a greenhouse gas that has 28-35 times the warming power of carbon dioxide
- Taking into account all the resources used to grow food, food waste uses up to 21 percent of fresh water, 19 percent of fertilizers, 18 percent of cropland and 21 percent of landfill volume
- At the retail level, half of all produce in the U.S. is thrown away because it is too "ugly."
- Take restaurant leftovers home
- Understand date labels,
- Avoid bargains that enable us to buy in quantities that encourage waste
- Compost table scraps and waste food (no meat)
- Encourage local municipalities to collect and compost waste food

Possible actions on a personal level:

- Take stock of what is in the cupboard and refrigerator before shopping
- Prepare a detailed shopping list
- Find creative ways to use leftovers
- Portion your plate so everything is eaten

The season of Lent brings us a renewed chance to reflect on our relationship to creation and to consider the words of Mahatma Gandhi "live simply so that others can simply live."

In the February 1990 Lux, Pastor George Madsen talks about the big and little things in life. A message that rings true in this new year.

Words and Deeds

by George Madsen

It is easy for us to be preoccupied with the big things of life and to miss the little things. It hardly needs saying that ULC has many “big things” on its mind – the call of a pastor whose primary ministry will be to, among, and with our youth and their families, selecting a new choir director, committees dealing with the critical matters of long-range planning, vision for mission, constitutional revision, welcome, disaster relief, evangelism, stewardship, education... It is easy to see God's

challenge and presence in such “big things,” but they often have a way of overshadowing the “little things,” the countless other signs of God's gracious love.

In recent pastoral contacts, I have been struck by many examples of “little things” that are simple, yet eloquent reminders of God's care of us. A hospitalized member astounded by the patience, the dedication, the care of total strangers. Gifts of food for hungry people. The offer of money to help those hit by disaster. A newfound delight in the beauty of the Psalms. A confirmand discovering new responsibility and excitement in the task at hand. A husband and a wife taking time to say a long-overdue kind word. Good humor



rather than ill-will over another's mistake. In time of trouble, old friends come just to sit, just to be there. Volunteers. A well-placed “thank you.” Someone trying to act in the very best interest of another. Words of encouragement.

Such little things, little signs of God's gracious love give shape, of course, to the big things, the big signs of God's gracious love! The good news is that each of us is called and equipped by God in Christ to bring just such words and deeds, however small, right where we live. That is our stewardship, our servanthood. Therein we become “signs of God's gracious love” - or, as Luther would put it, we become “little Christs.”


- From any device, click an address to bring up a map and directions.
