Grace and peace to you all, whatever you are facing today. Pr. Zachariah and I are delighted to serve with you. Together we dove right into the church season of Lent, which is traditionally a time of deep commitment to spiritual practices.

In Lent we get serious about digging in and following Jesus, knowing that the journey is worth it as God is at work bringing about new life. What a great time to join you all in this journey of faith! My hope is that this sets the tone for some very intentional,

As we begin our ministry together, I'd like to hear from you about your hopes and yearnings. collectively. Dear ones, God meets us precisely where we are hurting deepest. Richard Rohr writes, "Christ passionately and relentlessly loves us in a highly personalized way, wooing us toward wholeness in a vocabulary unique to each soul." (Richard Rohr, *The Universal Christ*, 2019, p.91)

How lovely that God cares so dearly for each one of us that we are invited to hear God's love personally, in our very own particular flavor, in the very depths of our deepest cracks buried within. What a good and beautiful God we have! Too often life becomes compartmentalized, and we don't get to

connect in the ways we yearn for. I doubt many of us simply need another "thing to do." We live in a frantic, busy culture. But even amidst countless distractions, God is ever present and at work. Christ teaches us what it means to stay clear and focused on what God is doing – even amid tugs in different directions. How are *you* witnessing the Holy Spirit stirring?

If you are struggling to hear God's love for you in your deepest places, I invite you to think back to a time when you felt particularly close to God. What was it about that time that drew you so near? As with all relationships, sometimes feeling distanced is a result of not carving out quality time together. Sometimes there are other forms of spiritual attack at play. Whatever your experience is, God longs to be close to you and remains present and active. *Always.* Thanks be to God!

Spring Break Trip

This year One Community Lutheran Campus Ministry group will be spending Spring Break (Feb 25-March 2) at the Montvale Springs Harmony Family Center near

Knoxville, Tennessee. A bit of history about our location is below:

"Located eight miles from Maryville Tenn., Montvale Springs is nestled in the foothills of Chilhowee Mountain adjoining the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. The land sustained the indigenous peoples of this area for thousands of years. Settlers discovered Montvale's mineral springs in 1832,

and by the mid-1800's Montvale Springs was the site of the 125-room Seven Gables Hotel which, at the height of its popularity became known as the Saratoga of the South where people from around the world came to take the healing, restorative waters found in the mineral springs. The original hotel was destroyed and rebuilt several times until it was once again destroyed by fire in 1933. In 1947, the property was sold to the YMCA for a summer camp that became a local institution, providing summer camp experiences for thousands of area children and youth until the camp closed in 2005.

Montvale's future was uncertain when former Camp Montvale counselor Sam Furrow purchased the property in 2008 and subsequently gifted it to Harmony with a vision of preserving the property as a place for people of all ages to enjoy. Montvale has since been placed in a conservation easement that restricts usage to programming that benefits children, families, and the community.



Today, visitors will find a picturesque mountain retreat with cabins, a barn and stable, a beautifully renovated dining hall which can also be used for indoor meeting

> space, a 155,000-gallon pool, a 17element challenge course, a climbing tower, numerous hiking trails, several open-air pavilions, basketball and sand volleyball courts, an athletic field, interactive playground, and more.

Since 2012, Harmony has utilized the property for therapeutic camps, retreats, and trainings. Private events held at Montvale allow Harmony to

continue to fund and expand our therapeutic work with children, adults, and families and ensures that Montvale continues to be a place of healing for generations to come." (https://harmonyfamilycenter.org/montvale/history)

Our focus for this trip is "Empathy for Creation." One way we will engage this focus is by volunteering with the Harmony Family Center's horse program. There is a need for various pieces of equipment to be built along their trails and fields. We will also be spending time in Scripture, focusing on Empathy for Self, Others, Nature, and All of Creation. We also hope to engage in God's good creation by hiking in the Smoky Mountains.

Please attend worship on March 3rd at 10 a.m. to hear more about our trip!

This month the ULC mobile library cart has books about Lent and Easter. As always, these books, including the ones on display, may be checked out right from the cart. We hope that




you will look over the books and check out any that interest you.



anticipation here in Michigan and in Honduras about being together again, renewing old friendships and making new friends.

It is worth noting that over the 24 years of this relationship, many changes have taken place. Now the volunteers are younger and include men. Beginning this year all eleven ICLH communities are involved in the project rather

than focusing on two or three areas.

Subject matter addressed has expanded. It began with simple first aid techniques and now includes food and dental care for children, safe water discussions, HIV/Aids support, health screenings for children, screening for men and women with follow-up care when needed, and spiritual support.

You can be a part of the April trip to Honduras! The team will be taking prayer cards with a photo,

name, and a simple prayer request on them to give to workshop participants. To be part of this, simply bring a photo of yourself (ones in the snow or that show off Michigan are always fun) and write a one- or two-line greeting / prayer request. Please put the messages in the basket near the Honduras display in the narthex by Mar. 31. The message will be translated and taken to Honduras. In Honduras the volunteers will make cards which we will bring back to you. This is a great way to connect with our partners in faith.

We try to include activities in the workshop that the volunteers can use in their communities. The prayer cards are one example. We are also planning to teach them how to make prayer squares, a project directly from ULC!

Look at Your Plastic Use During Lent

During this sacred season of Lent, let us embark on a spiritual journey that not only deepens our faith but also encourages reflection on our role as stewards of God's Creation. Genesis 3:19 teaches us, "You are dust, and to dust you shall return." This reminder of our humble origins and ultimate destination should instill in us a sense of responsibility for the Earth.

The ELCA Young Adults Ministry is leading a #NoPlasticforLent initiative which calls for prayer and action for Creation. The initiative is not just about plastics, the heart of the challenge is to commit to a practice that is achievable and

As mentors continue to work with students at Forest View Elementary School for one hour each week, they are using strategies to help students academically, emotionally, and socially. The weekly progress reports that the mentors write are a gold mine of these strategies or mentoring tips. The following list contains some of those tips.

- A great way to get a student to talk at the beginning of a session is to use a "How are you feeling today?" thermometer. The twelve facial expressions can be a fun way to describe the good and bad events of the day.
- A 15-minute sand timer can be used as a tool to help a student see how to use time wisely. If the timer is set on its side with each distraction, it is a visible reminder of being slowed down.

how they can react to it with a simple breathing exercise or splashing water on their face in the restroom.



The Problem We Still Live With

Ruby Bridges? If you remember Norman Rockwell, you likely remember Ruby. If not, search for Rockwell/*The Problem We All Live With* and her image will leap out of his painting. A diminutive girl in a white dress and white tennis shoes in stark relief against her dark brown skin. She is seen walking between four deputy U.S. Marshals as if she were prisoner until you

sne were prisoner until you look more closely at the stone wall behind her. It is stained by a tomato that had been thrown against it. The letters KK in front of the first pair of marshals; IGGER seen above her head. Then it dawns on you that she is not a prisoner. She is in protective custody. She was the first Black student to integrate a Louisiana school system. By herself. One small Black girl.

Ms. Ruby Bridges was the keynote speaker at the 39th annual Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Day of Celebration sponsored by the MLK Commission of Mid-Michigan. The theme of this celebration was *Retain Compassion in Times of Crisis*.

Ms. Bridges appeared in an interview format with Senator Sarah Anthony (D-M21). When asked to describe her feelings that day, she recalled being surprised by the number of people she was forced to walk through. The only other times she had seen a crowd of loud and screaming people was during Mardi Gras.

It was her first time encountering a white teacher and she was not sure how to act or what to do. White classmates were new to her as well. When she told her mom about her struggles to make friends, her mother told her 'But you don't know them.' She replied, "Mom, I will get to know them."

Her family had taught her that racism meant you had to trust your own kind. But her white teacher taught her to look for the character in people and not their color. Evil has no color. Tragically, she had that point driven home to her when her son was murdered by someone who looked like him.

She told us that a baby has no hate in its heart. A baby must be taught to hate, to rob them of the clean heart with which they are born. Slowly and over time, we take it (the clean heart) from them. So, she has chosen to work with young school children in hopes of preserving *their* clean hearts.

And then she left us with this: If the greatest commandment is to love, then the greatest sin is to not.

Kick Start Your Faith

This Lent Pastor Emily challenged us a bit with a daily reading list that spans the New Testament. If you are doing the readings, you've already realized that working through the New Testament in 40 days is not easy. Today I'm reading

Romans 9 to 17 and Romans 10:17 is a good reminder of why this is worthwhile: "Consequently faith comes from hearing the message, and the message is heard through the word of Christ." (The first letters of this verse used to be my password.)

Does your faith need a bit of a boost? Paul tells us hearing the message is a good place to start. Take his advice and spend 40 days working through the Lent reading plan as a faith kick starter. If you didn't start on Ash Wednesday, just start today and finish a few days after Easter. Hearing the word and taking communion is a good strategy too.

Try coming to church every Sunday in Lent as a faith builder. And if you want a habit to stick for the long term, nothing is better than being part of a community. Sunday worship is a good way to be

part of the ULC community, but if you really want to feel connected, plug in.

You can plug in anywhere. Sign up for Sunday Coffee. Attend the Tuesday Bible Study. Be an usher. Get to know the people you go to church with or get to know them again to build your sense of community and your faith. I think you will find the more you put into Church the more you will get out of it. See you on Sunday.

From the Treasurer

2023 Year End Financial Update

As of Dec. 31, 2023, we are 100 percent of the way through the year and have received 96 percent of what we had budgeted for pledged and non-pledged giving (around \$20,000 less than the budget). We spent 94 percent of budgeted expenses. This left us with a \$22,000 surplus for the year.

Council will be deciding on what to do with these funds in the coming months. Most expenses were budgeted for or already shared during the annual meeting. The only additional unbudgeted expenses since the annual meeting are related to the external audit, which should be completed by the end of February. Once complete, the report will be available to members. Overall, the monthly fluctuations in income and expenses are in line with prior year's trends. Other items to note, we installed solar panels and approved the installation of a new sound system (we are waiting on parts before this project can be completed). Collectively, we also gave over \$19,000 to various organizations through the Outreach of the Month, in addition to nearly \$58,000 in other benevolence activities.

The Finance Committee looks forward to another great year of stewardship and community outreach. For additional details about the 2023 financials, please contact me at treasurer@ulcel.org.

Easter is Early

In March 1978 Easter was early – something like this year. An article in Lux for that month follows. No author was listed.

Easter is Early but It Could Be Earlier

Easter will be celebrated March 26 this year, and if that seems early to you, you are right. It hasn't happened so early since 1967, and it won't be so early again until 1989. But the 26th isn't the

earliest date possible. In 1913, Easter was on March 23rd and that won't happen again until 2008, according to the World Almanac.

On the other hand, Easter can be rather late. In 1984, it will come on April 22^{nd} and in the year 2000, it will be on April 23.

The reason for the variation is that the first Council of the Christian Churches at Nicaea in 325 decreed that Easter would be observed on the first Sunday following the 14^{th} day of the Paschal Moon, that is the first moon



whose 14th day comes on or after March 21. That means Easter can come as early as March 21, as it last did in 1818, but won't again in this century or the next. The latest possible date is April 25. It came on that date in 1943 but won't be so late again until 2038. Easter this year is March 31st. Thanks to the internet, sleuthing in the subject is much easier than in 1978. According to census.gov Easter was on the earliest date of March 22 three times between 1600 and 2099 (1818 was listed as March 22 – not March 21 as stated above) while it was on the latest date of April 25 five times. The most frequent dates are March 31 (this year) and April 16 with 22 times each. What I found in census.gov for this century:

Earliest: In 2062 and 2073 Easter will be on March 26. In 2046 Easter will be on March 25. Latest: In 2095 Easter will be on April 24. In 2038 Easter will be on April 25.
