From the Pastor's Pen . . .

Remembering the Saints

November contains one of my favorite festivals, All Saint's Day, Nov.1. Not everyone remembers, it gets overshadowed by its much more popular neighbor, Halloween. And perhaps that's part of the reason I like it so much. There aren't any All Saints displays in the stores, no greeting cards, not many customs or traditions. It's a quiet festival that slips under the radar and

sneaks in. You've got to be intentional about celebrating it or you'll miss it. And that seems fitting for the saints.

All Saint's is the day that we remember the folks who have died in the faith and give thanks to God for them. Often, churches read the names of church members and family members who have passed in the last year. Sometimes we remember some of the historic saints. Occasionally we'll give some thought to the unnamed saints that fill in the gaps. However, we do it, remembering the saints is a really important thing to do.

But saints are more than historic figures. A saint is anyone who tries to live out their faith in Jesus Christ. They are the people sitting next to you in the pew or that volunteer with you. It may not seem like much, but they are really quite important. The saints help connect us with each other. They remind us that we didn't get here by ourselves, and we're not headed into the future alone, the saints are with us.

Coming to a new congregation, I am particularly aware of the saints. Saints that founded this congregation and those that taught the faith to generations of children. The faithful who emphasized the importance of the campus ministry or helped create the building and maintained the grounds. Saints who supported the ministries over the years with their financial gifts and time and those that worked behind the scenes with little recognition. Faithful who sing and pray, who chat and welcome. Without all these saints, there wouldn't have been a church. Without all of you, there wouldn't be a church today. And without

both, there won't be a church here tomorrow. I give thanks for all these saints.

I certainly don't know the names of all the saints that have been here (I'm still trying to remember all the names of folks I've met the last couple weeks). In truth, I doubt anyone—other than God—knows all of the names of the saints who have contributed of themselves

to this congregation. Yet without them, ULC wouldn't be the congregation that it is today. And that is something to celebrate.

You may wish to take a moment in early November to celebrate the saints in your life or in this congregation:

- Share a story with your family about a saint from your past—someone who helped you understand the importance of faith.
- See if you can't find out something about one of the saints of this congregation. What's one of the stories of the artists behind some of the artwork in our building? Do you know the story behind a part of the building and who helped with it? What's the story of someone who helped get a ministry here going?
- Ask someone on Sunday to share a story about the person who got them going to church.
- Invite someone who has lost a loved one this year to share a story about them with you.

November Outreach of the Month ULC Endowment Funds

ULC is blessed to have two
Endowment Funds – the ULC
General Endowment Fund and the
ULC Campus Ministry Endowment
Fund – both of which contribute
financial support from the
gain/growth that the fund realizes
each year and over time.

These funds are to be used for activities/projects that support ULC's mission and vision. Your gift this year to either the General or Campus Ministry Endowment Funds will allow the Funds to continue supporting activities and projects in the years to come.

Your gift will enable continued financial support for grants within the three following categories:

A) Mission In Christ's World The Endowment Fund gives priority to support of missions of the ELCA including development of new congregations in North America, equipping leaders for the mission of the Church; support professional educational growth; global mission;

ecumenism/interfaith; evangelism; and social ministries.

B) Christ's Mission Among Us Funds are provided to efforts that enrich ULC programming as identified by ULC Church Council and teams; special programs

designed for those persons in our congregation who are in spiritual or economic need; contributions to improvement of ELCA facilities and building programs; and debt reduction.

Since the funds were approved by the Congregation in February 2000, over \$65,000 has been awarded from the Campus Ministry Endowment Fund for campus ministry events and projects, and over \$151,000 from the General Endowment Fund - totaling

over \$216,000 of grants. Over the past few years the Endowment Committee has supported: multiple campus ministry alternative spring break and mission trips; purchase of computers for elementary students in Columbia; creation of a library in Namibia; multiple food packing events; several solar array projects (ULC, South Side Community Coalition, Islamic Center); racism workshop; "Health for Life" project in Honduras; multiple prison reform projects; ULC outdoor summer concert series; racial justice coaching; ULC worship expressions; and many other significant projects.

Christmas Quilt-a-Thon Rescheduled

Our Christmas Quilt-a-Thon was rescheduled to Saturday, Nov. 11 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. For an amazing low price of \$10, everyone attending will receive a kit with fabric and instructions to make a quilt top, a pizza and salad lunch, and great fellowship with members, friends and other quilters who are planning to join the fun day. The kits are made from donated fabric that we cannot use for prayer quilts. Check the signup sheet in the Narthex. It will be a fun day!

In September, 80 Sani-Pad bags for young women and girls in Mali were brought to the in-take center for shipping. Each contained sanitary supplies in a bag that can be discreetly carried to school. In addition, over 250 pairs of panties were included to be distributed with the bags.

Our second "Noisy Offering" brought the total amount raised for supplies to fill the 100 Lutheran World Relief School Kits to a little over the \$700 we needed. It was wonderful to have the backpacks filled and boxed up for shipping following the Oct. 1 worship service. Many thanks for your generous support of this churchwide mission. And a very special thank you to Ellie Korroch who made all the wonderfully unique backpacks, and to


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Jesus and John Wayne

The Kids Hope USA website and Pinterest also have lots of fun ideas for mentors to use.

November is another great month for mentoring because Veterans Day and Thanksgiving offer more possibilities for activities. The first holiday is an

opportunity to learn about veterans and why we honor them. A book or newspaper article about a famous veteran could be a good learning tool. A student might have a family member who served in the service and could share about them. A thank you card for a veteran would be a nice touch. Thanksgiving activities often focus on making turkeys with small stuffed paper bags with colorful feathers for a tail. Once again books can provide a story of how Thanksgiving began or simply a

story of things in our life for which we can be thankful.

Mentoring in any month can be a joyful activity when it is geared to the interests and age of a student. If a child enjoys art, colored pencils or paints might be linked to drawing about events at home, school or in the community. If a child is physically active, taking a walk outside or kicking a ball around the playground or gym is an option. When a student likes to tell stories, their creativity can be channeled into writing/drawing a booklet with the help of their mentor.

There are so many activities for a mentor to use in developing a relationship with a student in the one hour each week. A mentor does make a big difference for a child!

transparent with the results. To this end, the full Synod Consultation Panel report is available in the church office. An email on this matter was sent to ULC members on Oct 19, 2023. If you did not receive that email and feel you should have or if you have any questions, please talk to the Council President.

Our goal is for ULC to be a safe place with an expansive table that includes everyone. We appreciate your support as we continue to hold ourselves, and one another, accountable for becoming more loving, expansive, and welcoming.

ULC Archives

Sixty years ago on Nov. 22, 1963, President John F. Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas Texas. Two days later Pastor Walter Wietzke reflected on that event and preached the following sermon.

"There, Was a Man!"

You will excuse me this morning, if, due to the assassination of our president, I defer the preaching of the announced sermon to another

time, and address you, instead, from the standpoint of these words in the Gospel of John:

"There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came for testimony, to bear witness to the light, that all might believe through him!"

The obvious reference in this reading is to John, the Baptist, the forerunner of Christ. It is he who, pointing to the Christ, cried out, "behold the lamb of God that taketh away the sins of the world." It is he who said, "this is the light of the world" and this life, we say, is the Light of man.

Many years before this another wise man said, "The spirit of man is the candle of the Lord," and which among us can deny that where that candle has been lighted, that spirit has been set burning by the presence of God, a witness and testimony has shined forth in our oft-darkened world.

Nineteen centuries and three decades after these words were spoken, they might well be spoken again, "There was a man sent from God, whose name was John."

Like the Baptist, he bore witness to the truth. Like <u>all</u> men, he was a fallible human being; like <u>some</u> men, his spirit was aflame with the presence of the Lord. His ministry was in the world of politics, but he knew the power of the Almighty, and he knew what that meant for himself, and those he called "fellow citizens."

Just three years ago, and a little more, as he campaigned for the office of chief executive, he said, "I will close by telling you of a letter which Lincoln wrote in a campaign much like this. He wrote to a friend, "I know there is a God, and I

know He hates injustice. I see the storm coming, and I know His hand is in it. But, if he has a place and a part for me, I am ready." Now, a hundred years later, when the issue is still freedom or slavery, we know there is a God, and we know he hates injustice. We see a storm coming, and we know His hand is in it. But, if he has a place and "a part for me", I believe we are ready."

His readiness was apparent in his witness. Unspoiled by the fear and cynicism of the age, he moved among kings and potentates as a man, but a man grasped by God.

His devotion was manifest in his worship, and in his home, where a little girl and a tiny boy found the Light of the world, and the warmth of God reflected in the life of their father.

The storm has come. It is hard for us to see the hand of God in it. Beneath the nations' grief men question the reality of Providence; they talk instead of fate. No response can be given. EXCEPT THE RESPONSE OF FAITH, THE RESPONSE OF OTHER SPIRITS AFLAME WITH THE PRESENCE OF THE LORD, who believe, death notwithstanding, that God shall not leave Himself without witness; that He shall raise up, as He has always has, faithful witnesses – that He shall light, as He has always lit, the spirit of those witnesses, that He has "a place and a part" for those who will receive it.

There was a man sent from God whose name was John. It was but little time, really, that we shared his presence. But the presence of Him who sent him is always with us. To Him we say, "Father, help us see your hand in the storms that overtake us."

Of ourselves we say, "help us to bear witness to the Light." Of that leader mourned in death, we say, "There was a man, <u>sent</u> from God, whose name was John!" We say, <u>There</u>, <u>was a man!</u>
