International Ministry Opportunity for the Friendship House MSU Conversation Partners Needed!

Old News: With the start of the new semester, we have a number of new international students here at the Friendship House and are waiting for an American English-speaking partner.

New News: Many of our international community members are married with children and are seeking family friends so we are seeking our English-speaking families to connect and learn from.

What you need to know: Typically, the individual partners meet once a week for about 60 - 90 minutes and can start out (and continue) at the Friendship House MSU and then shift to meeting at a coffeehouse, or over lunch, or at the American partner's home or church.

Family partnerships can be more challenging to schedule, but our hope is the families can meet at least once per



month but will leave that up to the families to decide the frequency of the meetings.

Conversation Partner? You already know it: English. You also have the motivation to want to help someone from another country who often feels homesick, isolated, and culturally shocked.



ULC will soon be doubling our access to solar energy with the installation of the ground-mount solar array just north of the west parking area.

The new 20.25-kilowatt solar panels have been installed and Absolute Solar is waiting for a back-ordered inverter to arrive. When installed, the unit will be fully functional. This unit is predicted to provide 25.8 Megawatt Hours (MWH) per year or a little less than 50 percent

of the 48.2 MWH that ULC currently purchases from Consumers Energy for electricity.

Together with our existing 19.84kilowatt rooftop unit, which produces 19.3 MWH per year, we expect to produce about two thirds of the electricity that ULC uses in a year.

These solar panels will provide ULC with considerable monetary savings well into the future. In addition, we will reduce our carbon footprint and put "practice stewardship of God's creation," into action.

Making ULC More Accessible

Recently a group of congregation members (Michael Anderson, Sue Kamens, Deanna Milligan, Beth Raye, Robert Smith, Amy Wagenknecht) met to discuss how ULC could be more meaningful to people with challenges, seen or unseen. Our building has good access for mobilitychallenged individuals and now we are looking for ways to make the worship experience positive and inclusive for all worshippers.

In our Statement of Intentional Welcome, "We commit to remove all barriers that exclude people from full and active participation in our church."

The worship experience is meant to be inspirational and joyful to all.

- We come together to find refuge from a stormy world and hear the comforting words of our Lord. For some people, it is not easy to relax and release their outside cares for worship.
- We sing praise and rise for prayers and gather at the altar for communion. Again, mobility challenged worshippers can have some concerns. Finding a place to park a walker or a wheelchair can be frustrating. Others are sensitive to loud sounds and bright lights. Some may not hear as well. Some may have limited visual acuity.
- The organ swelling so that you can almost feel it, but some with sensory audio sensitivity can be overwhelmed by the noise no matter how beautiful it is.
- Flowers perfume the air, but some with allergies can react with sneezes or asthma attacks.
- Candles and lights illuminate the space, but some can be overwhelmed by the intensity and glare.

- As a congregation we gather to worship as a tightly knit group, but some can be nervous and on edge in crowded situations.
- We have made many changes to our building to allow access and participation for mobility challenged individuals yet realize there are likely more physical barriers that need to be addressed.
- We realize that many disabilities are invisible to the observer but can make worship in our sanctuary a trigger for anxiety and discomfort.

"The newly formed Accessibility Team will be exploring options and resources to meet people where they are while also focusing to help our members identify their gifts so they can be used in ministry to the Lord and our neighbors. We will work with staff and other teams to identify areas of possibilities for meeting these challenges within our community.

We will also recognize the caregivers and the importance of their role in this process. We are exploring alternative worship spaces and style opportunities.

We will be asking for input via a survey and will appreciate all responses. We will also participate in the Ministry Fair on Oct. 29 to answer questions and have a chance to let the congregation know what we are doing.

Kids Hope USA - Survey Results

At the end of each school year, the Kids Hope USA National Support team surveys the directors from each ministry, and, in turn, the directors survey their own

mentors and prayer partners. Participating teachers and the principal may be included. These surveys are a good way to evaluate a ministry.



The surveys are helpful because they can

indicate if things are going well or where change is needed. A typical response from our local mentor surveys was a list of games or books to obtain for use during the mentoring hour. A very thoughtful comment from one survey was "In the moment – the time we spend together at Forest View – I can tell the child is soaking up the oneon-one attention. It is harder to know what the long-term effects might be. I do believe having someone they can count on to show up is important." Our local mentors are helpful with good suggestions and observations written on the evaluations.

The Fall 2023 Presidential Update from Kids Hope USA came in the mail recently with mentor and director survey results given for the 2022-23 school year nationally.

Thirty-five percent of mentors have been with their student for over two years. This percentage is interesting because last year two out of 12 of our mentors had

students leave the school with one mentor having three students in a year. At risk families move a lot and those children often attend multiple schools in a year.

USA The goal of a Kids Hope USA mentor is to establish a relationship with an at-risk student, so they feel special and loved. In the national survey 90 percent of mentors were encouraged about their relationship with their student. 99 percent of mentors found their time valuable with their student. Kids Hope USA must be doing something right to end up with those numbers! The title for this section of information in the report was "Celebrating Relationships."

Additional surveys from mentors and directors had the following information:

• The impact on students was the biggest in these key areas – social-emotional skills, confidence, and attitude.

Lutherans and Native Nations

As part of the civil rights movement of the 1960s and '70s, the Doctrine of Discovery began to crack. The Doctrine allowed European, and later American, nations to claim lands occupied by Indigenous or other non-European, non-Christian people as federal property. White U.S. citizens started to examine the tragic histories of their non-white neighbors and question such ideas as manifest destiny, which argued that God favored white settlement of North America.

In 1970, the Lutheran Council in the United States of America (LCUSA) partnered with members of the American Indian Movement to create the National Indian Lutheran Board, which raised funds, provided grants, and lobbied on behalf of Native Americans and Native American entities. It was a unique and treasured time when Indians and Lutherans came together to understand one another, to appreciate each other's cultures, and to join in a fight for justice in Indian Country.

But the group was disbanded with the breakup of the LCUSA and the founding of the ELCA. At that time the ELCA hoped to take on the board's work, but this idea fell victim to the struggle of merging the ELCA's three predecessor bodies into one and navigating the new responsibilities of multicultural ministry. In the 1990s, the ELCA formally adopted a strategic plan and vision for Indigenous peoples, creating the American Indian and Alaska Native Lutheran Association.

But more needed to be done. The ELCA Churchwide Assembly formally <u>repudiated the Doctrine of Discovery</u> <u>in 2016</u>, citing the Augsburg Confession's prohibition against "the improper mixing of the power of the church and the power of the sword" and laying out seven objectives for the ELCA. Some were straightforward, such as stating repentance and seeking reconciliation with the many Native American nations throughout the United States. Other objectives require more work and consideration, such as correcting the centuries-old colonial mindset that approved of seizing land from Indigenous peoples without any agreement or compensation.

- 3rd-5th graders more often engage in conversation and character building.

The survey results also include which states have Kids Hope USA ministries. Since Kids Hope USA started in Michigan, it is no surprise that it has the most. Other top states are Texas, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, and Colorado. Even Alaska and Hawaii are represented!

August ULC Council met via Zoom on Aug. 16 and here are some highlights from the discussion:

- Pastor Gary is still seeking someone to lead Confirmation class.
- During the pastoral transition, Sue Kamens will help assist Campus Ministry Student Associates.
- Giving is still on track and the budget is currently net positive.
- The council will review proposed 2024 budget in September, despite unknowns surrounding personnel costs.
- The Finance Committee has recommended an external audit process, no decisions have yet been made.



- Appointments: Steve Viele and Jeff Andresen, Personnel Committee; Kathy Sweat, Jay DuBois-Jones, Erin Frisch, Lori Johnson, and Will Mahoney, Call Committee.
- A designated fund has been established for Food Movers to allow for more flexibility in paying costs in future years.
- Approved bid for pothole/ patching repair from general budget due to urgently needed repairs in the parking lot.

September

ULC Council met in person (with virtual participation option) on Sept.

19 and here are some highlights from the discussion:

- Racial justice presentation: Motion for racial justice team to lead the congregation through a process of learning about our history and exploring racial repair and reparations.
- Approved an increase in stipend for the for the extra workload taken on by High School Youth Leader, Student Associates, and Worship Wednesday Leader during transition period (paid out of Youth/Campus Ministry designated funds)
- Approved one-time stipends to compensate for increased workload during the transition period for Janine Novenske Smith and Mandy O'Neill

- $\circ~$ Things most significant/meaningful during your time at ULC
 - Helping the congregation get through the pandemic took a lot of time and effort.
 - Changes that have occurred in worship over the last six years. Headed in some new directions and still a lot of room for continuing.
 - Kids Hope ministry seeing people at ULC excited about the ministry.
- Things that are left on the table/still need to be done.
 - Continuing the path with worship and push it further. Only just begun being creative with worship.
 - Continuing to grow racial justice team and doing more in the community.
 - Looking at how ULC is structured staff-wise given size, budget, etc. Do we still need all the staff? Is having two pastors the best model for us at this point? Are there other ways we can do what we're doing? We need discussion on that.
 - How do we grow our high school youth ministry?
 - We have a marvelous space downstairs that is really underutilized.
- Going back in time to early in the morning on the first day at ULC, what would you tell yourself in the first day on the job?

- Forget about all the policies and procedures (an exaggeration, but this congregation has way too many).
- Do you want a pastor or an administrator? With the number of policies, it's very administrative.
- Take more time for pastoral stuff.
- A Bible story or verse that will help synod find the next pastor for ULC: Road to Emmaus – Jesus walks with his followers. Will be important for a pastor to walk alongside and to lead the congregation in a caring way, accepting the congregation where they are, but pushing them forward. Accompanying, but also pushing.
- ULC is a gifted place in terms of facility, talent, and financial situation.
- Covenant for departing pastors.
 - Agree to pray for the new pastor.
 - Not be involved in advisory role (public or private) at ULC.
 - Not to engage in any action that could undermine new pastor.
 - Will not do pastoral care duties for ULC members.

Lead Management Team Notes

Campus Ministry (Sue Kamens) -Pastor Gary met with two of the student Associates. They were able to get a list of names at Sparticipation which will be added to the list of students notified each week of Friday@Five. They had a table at Faith Fest, a gathering specifically for faith organizations. We are forming a campus ministry team of at least three ULC members to serve as a support and resource in the absence of a campus pastor. Environmental Empathy/Justice is the theme chosen for this year.

Care Team (Linda Trevarthen) -Card Ministry continues to send out 20-30 cards every month (including Prayer List, milestone birthdays/anniversaries, each month's Prayer Partner Churches within the synod, and others as needed.) The Meal Ministry has a number of meals stored in the freezer that will need to be distributed in the next month. **Social Action (Bryan Rahe)** - The food distribution in August served 267 families. The next distribution is scheduled for Sept. 28. Cost sharing with the Food Bank will begin Jan. 1, 2024. We still need volunteers to help with registration and traffic control or to pack food into vehicles.

Grounds (Norm Jolin, Sr.) - A contract has been signed to have the parking lot repaired this year.

ULC Archives

Welcome to the ULC Archive Collection

Do you know where the ULC archives can be found? You will be able to see the archives collection during the Ministry Fair on Oct. 15 and view some of the treasures it contains.

The archives are located in the first room on the left when you walk into the education wing. It is the room with the window into the atrium; the room used to be the office for the custodian. There is an enclosed room behind the office which contains most of the collection.

The original archives collection was in the tower – up steep stairs and hot in the summer, cold in the winter, and humid almost any time. This new location on the lower level is



easily accessible and is a much more stable environment to store items.

One item we plan to share is an "Old Time Movie" of the construction of the Ann St. Church in 1947. The 35 mm film was found in the 1975 time capsule. Since then, it was copied onto a DVD, and then onto a thumb drive for the 2023 time capsule.

You will be able to see a brass cross that was used when church was held in the State theater and then later in the Ann St. Church and a church treasurer's book from 1941. You are welcome to search for an item yourself and see what we have. We hope you will stop in and view some ULC treasures.

Jesus and John Wayne is a sweeping account that reveals how American evangelicals have worked for decades to replace the Jesus of the gospels with an idol of rugged masculinity and Christian nationalism — or, in the words of one modern chaplain, with a "spiritual badass." As Kristin Kobes Du Mez explains, the key to understanding this transformation is to recognize the role of culture in modern American evangelicalism. Evangelical books, films, music, clothing, and merchandise influence the beliefs of millions, and evangelical popular culture is teeming with muscular heroes — mythical warriors and rugged soldiers, men like John Wayne, Mel Gibson, Donald Trump, and the Duck Dynasty clan, who assert white masculine power in defense of "Christian America." The values at the heart of white evangelicalism today — patriarchy, authoritarian rule, aggressive foreign policy, fear of Islam, ambivalence toward #MeToo, and opposition to Black Lives Matter and the LGBTQ community — have transformed the faith, with enduring consequences for all Americans.
